Erna, would you please stand up, representing the agency, which introduced to us the new owner for 8 Brewster Lane and kept him until the end? Let's give them our heart-felt thanks with a round of applause. (clapping)

And Joan and Ed, thank you for having been so patient with our church procedures and giving your lovely home to us.

Now, let's give thanks to God, who has been with us in our ups and downs in our past. As Ecclesiastes says, "There's a season for everything."
